HOPE

An old Chinese curse says, "May you live in interesting times." This is another way of saying "may you live in uncertain times!" And we do so-live in quite uncertain times! What should we do? Should we view our glass as being half-full or half-empty? Our attitude is crucial because it provides momentum-positive or negative-which may determine our destiny. This is a delicate balance—things could go either way, depending on our outlook. What is needed in times such as these? Hope! Hope is the bridge from uncertainty and despair to faith and assurance. Hope begins at the point of our real need-when we feel deficient or alarmed. At that point of desperation, hope starts with a longing, then it becomes an aspiration, and finally it grows into an expectation. How does this work? When we face problems in trying times, our 'trials' serve a purpose. In difficulty times such as these, we yearn for something better. So, at some indefinable point, our attitude moves from negative to positive. How? In desperation-we reach out in doubt, even fear, for a lifeline. God, in his foresight and wisdom, has already thrown us the lifeline—and then He shines His light on it. We reach out and grope, then grab it in faith, and then we hold on for dear life without seeing other end. So-hope is our desperate and fragile first glimmer of faith. Hope is then fueled by growing faith. Emil Brunner—"hope is faith holding out its hand in the dark" But, hope comes first, remember, "faith is substance of things hoped for" (Hebrews 11:1). This hope actually begins with some kind of promise—then it is nurtured by faith, which begins to believe the promise will be fulfilled. Hope, in fact, is actually several things. FRENCH LEGION OF HONOR MEDAL

If you have never applied for the French Legion of Honor Medal and wonder if you meet the requirements, please read the free standing insert that came in this newsletter. The qualifications and protocol / procedure is very specific and exact - no exceptions! Someone cannot apply for a deceased veteran, and the French Government determines whether or not you are eligible. When you read the enclosed page of information, NOTE! THE PROCESS WILL TAKE AT LEAST 9 MONTHS BEFORE YOU RECEIVE AN ANSWER! If your application is accepted, the French Embassy in your region will tell you what the options are for receiving the medal. If you think you qualify after reading the criteria, you are encouraged to at least apply - while you are still alive! Several of our veterans have already received this medal, and we have printed their information in several past newsletters. You won't know unless you try!

How to Get Your Medals

So, you want to get your well-deserved medals. Just follow these simple steps and you'll have them in no time.

You also can fill out your request online at www.vetrees.archives.gov.

It may take a little time (as long as three months in some instances),
but rest assured, you will get the awards you deserve.

STEP 1: Obtain a Standard Form 180 (SF 180) available at www.archives.gov/ research/order. Mail it to the appropriate address listed below based on your military service. Be sure to fill out the SF 180 as completely as you can. Service and social security numbers must be included. If you do not

have the requested information, write "NA," meaning the information is "not available."

STEP 2: Once your request has been processed. it will be forwarded to the facility from which the medals are mailed, You will receive a response showing which medals were verified for Army and Air Force veterans. For Navy, Coast Guard and Marines, you will receive a referral letter from NPRC.

STEP 3: If you experience problems with the verification process, write to the address listed for your military service. To check the status of your request, you can e-mail: mpr.status@nara.gov.

ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS

- If the REFRAD date, discharge date, retirement date or date of death in service is more than 62 years old, the record is considered "archival," and replacement medals will only be processed at the request of the living veteran, retiree or next-of-kin (children or surviving, unmarried spouse).
- With the exception of the Coast Guard, the military service departments no longer transfer records to NPRC. In some cases, NPRC may have to refer the medals request to the appropriate service department. This is especially true for Air Force. Army records are accessible by NPRC staff through DPRIS for those separated/retired 1992 or later.
- Current members of the military should contact their unit or purchase replacement modals at their clothing sales/PX.
- In most cases, only a single set of replacement medals will be issued, and generally only to the veteran and next of kin.
- Personnel whose records were lost in the 1973 fire should include a copy of the separation document (WD 53-55 and/or DD-214) with the eVetRecs signature page or SF-180.

For more than 10 years a small film company has been working to bring the WWII film of the National archives into your home. At this past 90th reunion in Fort Worth, **Combat Reels**, a WWII Archival Film company, released updated versions of their first two 90th

Division DVDs and also released a new one to boot. The first two DVDs covering Normandy (brown cover ®2005) and the Liberation of Western Europe (blue cover ®2008), have been re-released with additional footage on each of them and additional information about the footage on those DVDs. The look of the DVDs has also changed as well with the release of their newest DVD covering the 90th during the winter war and the Battle of the Bulge. With the newest release, the 90th has more than 3 hours of raw footage from the battlefields spread over the different 3 DVDS to enjoy. Over the past 8 years many persons within the Association have found images of themselves or their relative on these reels of history. Could YOU be the next one? A guiding principal at Combat Reels is that all of the faces on all of the footage that is presented belong to some family here in the U.S. They are someone's father, uncle, brother, or even grandfather. It is a unique opportunity to view all of the known footage of a particular unit in a manner that allows you to actually follow the Division's path in film and at the same time have the best chance possible to see someone you may know.



will be Floyd Leimkiller. Burial with full military honors will be in the California City



place called Milton Gardens and raised vegetables and pigs for the war effort. Pig pens [stys] needed to be cleaned. The gov't assigned a German POW to work details. Hans was about 21 & was from a sunken submarine. He was an aspiring opera singer. Jean could reach a high "C". They lightened their unpleasant task by singing opera back and forth while cleaning the pig stys. Hans was a hard working man who required no shotgun supervision on his shift. At times, there were 3 stationed POWs

who were less hard working and not as trustworthy, requiring the family shot gun to be close at hand. At the end of the war, Hans returned to Germany where he had a girlfriend named Rosa. American Military bases contracted with Jean's father to pick up waste garbage for the pigs. Jean wore a pair of red bib overalls. She got a lot of razzing from the G. I.s - until they saw her hefting 1/2 cans of wet oatmeal. She then gained their respect. At times, extra gifts were included in these regular pick-ups from the military kitchens things like a can of spam when meat was so hard to come by." [Ed.: Cameta's Eulogy was fascinating but 3 full pages, so we could not include it. Look for Darrell's song in the "Remember When" section of this newsletter. Thank you, Darrell, for all the information. I really enjoyed reading it.]

A SPECIAL TRIBUTE TO OUR DEAR FRIEND OF THE 90TH, BRUNO EHLICH, WRITTEN BY VERN SCHMIDT WHO GAVE THIS REMEMBRANCE AT THE FORT WORTH REUNION ON SATURDAY NIGHT

A CELEBRATION OF THE LIFE AND FRIENDSHIP OF BRUNO EHLICH - by friend, Vern Schmidt. 358/E

Saying "goodbye" to an Association member is difficult. Bruno Ehlich, our Hitler Youth kid from WW II, left his earthly home on June 7, 2013 for his Eternal Home after a lengthy battle with cancer. To some here today, you may not be familiar with Bruno as his story with the 90th began as a 9 year old boy on April 24, 1945 in the woods near Leuchtenberg, Germany. Bruno's life was filled with tragedy, excitement, and anticipation as WW II brought his family from Austria to Germany, and his father became a tank commander on the Russian Front. With the closing of public schools in 1945, Bruno became a Hitler Youth Soldier at 9 years of age as a crew member of an anti-tank gun which resulted in his capture by A Co. 357th Regiment, 90th Division in Leuchtenberg on April 24, 1945.

Years after completing his education, he moved to Australia and retired as a Sgt. in the Royal Australian Air Force. His service during the Vietnam ERA resulted in his contact with Agent Orange which eventually brought about a 20 year battle with cancer.

Our first acquaintance with Bruno was a result of his search on the internet in 2002 as he was trying to find his liberators from WW II. This led him to Glenn and Vern Schmidt in the USA. Vern remembered the village of Leuchtenberg from occupational duties with the 90th. A lasting relationship resulted from many hours of phone calls, and the 90th Division became a household word for Bruno.

Bruno attended our 90th Division reunion in 2005 at Corpus Christi, TX where he thanked the "Tough 'Ombres" for his liberation which changed the destiny of his life. His many stories in the 90th newsletter always ended with a "Thank You."

In 2008, Norm Richards, Chuck Griffith, Vem Schmidt and son, Chris, met Bruno in Leuchtenberg where he showed us the street corner where a Tough 'Ombre from A Co, 357th set him and his family free from a nightmare of terror that lasted 5 years.

If Bruno were standing at this podium today, his closing remarks would be: "God Bless the 90th "Division with all its heroes and those who never came home, & to those who sacrificed their lives for my freedom and the freedom of my country. I thank you from the bottom of my heart. Bruno Ehlich"

Many of us who knew this man realized that his view as a young boy, that this war brought undue tragedy, sorrow, and death to millions due to an idea from an ill crazed mind of a man named Adolf Hitler. Bruno's story "Bom On the Wrong Side of the Fence" describes in some 100+ pages the sufferings of his family and friends during his adolescent years. We, who knew him well, will always cherish his unwavering love for the 90th.

[Ed.: Bruno was an extraordinary man, and those of us who had the honor of meeting him have been greatly blessed by his courage and unwavering faith in his Savior, Jesus Christ, as he fought so valiantly against the cancer that ravaged his body for so many years. Because of his faith, we know that indeed, he is now with his Savior in Heaven, and we shall see him again some day. But while we are still here on earth, we will always miss him & the many contributions of friendship through sending stories to us. You are truly free now, Bruno - no pain, no sickness, no more struggles, no more death. You are whole again and Home at last!]

Colonel Robert H. Schulz, USA (Ret.)

Colonel Robert H. Schulz served as commandant of cadets at NMMI from 1969 to 1971.

In WWII, Captain Schulz participated in the Normandy invasion. He went ashore at "Utah Beach" on D+2 as the company commander of the heavy weapons company of the 2nd Battalion, 358th Infantry, with the 90th Tough 'Ombres Division.

Attacking from the beachhead, the 358th pushed through the treacherous hedgerows and fought the battle of Pont l'Albe on 10-12 June 1944 and the battle ROSWELL DAILY RECORD
of Golleville-Urville on 17 June 1944. on
During this period, a bullet penetrated hele
Schulz's helmet, but failed to harm him. in a

Moving steadily south down the West Coast of the Cotentin Peninsula, the 358th was heavily engaged in the hedgerows. Causalties were heavy, and Captain Schulz, the senior-surviving officer, found himself in command of the 2nd Battalion. In the vicinity of La Hayedu-Puits, he led a highly successful bayonet charge against the Germans, which was instrumental in maintaining the forward movement and momentum of the battalion. For this action, he was awarded the Silver Star.

During the battle for the Falaise Gap

on 17 August 1944, the 2nd Battalion was held up by a German Tiger tank concealed in a barn. The tank rolled out frequently to fire its 88mm gun with devastating effects. Schulz, again in command of the battalion and having lost the heavy weapons commander, led a rocket launcher team into close proximity of the barn to get an effective shot from the Bazooka. The untrained gunner was unsure of himself, and Schulz seized the exposed tank, and destroyed it. This action earned Schulz, now a major, the Distinguished Service Cross.

With the fast-moving Third Army, the 90th Division participated in General Patton's classic move to destroy the German salient in the Ardennes forest. The actions of Major Schulz during the "Battle of the Bulge" were recognized by an award of the Belgian Croix de Guerre.

Colonel Schulz retired from the United States Army in 1969. His decorations include the Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star, two Bronze Stars, the Legion of Merit, and the French and Belgian Croix de Guerre.

Following his service as commandant of cadets at NMMI, Colonel Schulz taught economics at Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell from 1972 until 1982. He lives in retirement in Roswell.

Decorated veteran of WWII awarded French Legion of Honor

ewitt Wells of Winston-Salem felt his feet freeze in the bitter cold of the Battle of the Bulge and walked across France after the D-Day invasion of Normandy.

For his service, he has been awarded the French Legion of Honor by Denis Bardet, the French consul general to the Southeast United States.

Wells, 88, was one of six World War II veterans inducted Monday into the Legion of Honor in Charlotte.

He was drafted into the Army in October 1943 and did his basic training at Camp Butner in North Carolina. He was part of the 90th Infantry Division known for engaging in some of the fiercest fighting in Europe. The division shipped out to England and went to France in June 1944.

"I didn't like France in '44," Wells said.
"I had a trip across France, but I had to walk."

He said he can't describe the scene at MEDAL, Page A7

Utah Beach as he waded ashore from the landing craft. Utah Beach was the code name given for the westernmost flank of the D-Day invasion of Normandy along its beaches.

"You don't think about what's ahead," he said. "You do what you have to do."

Wells said the first thing he learned in France was keep your head down.

"My number just didn't come up on a bullet, thank the Lord," he said.

Wells also fought in the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944 and January 1945. His feet froze, and he lost all of his toenails, though they eventually grew back. He was taken to a hospital in Paris, then returned to the U.S. to finish his recuperation.

Wells said he heard about the Legion of Honor award and contacted the French consulate about it. They requested that he

send them a copy of his discharge papers, and in January they invited him to take part in Monday's award ceremony.

"I talked with the other veterans and

met the mayor," he said.

The Legion of Honor was created more than 200 years ago by Emperor Napoleon the First and is France's highest civilian honor. American soldiers who fought in France during World War II are eligible for the honor.

June Findlay, a friend of Wells, was invited to the ceremony. She said that when Wells was presented the medal, he thanked Bardet and told him. "I'll never do it again."

"Dewitt's an amazing man," Findlay
said. "He's always sharing his faith and
love of his family."

were flown to Washington, D.C., to see the World War II memorial. She's a flight attendant and volunteered to help on the flights.

"We walked all over Washington looking at the memorials," she said. "I'm proud to have the honor of walking with those heroes."

Originally from Poughkeepsie, N.Y., Wells and his family relocated to Kernersville in 1971. He remembered North Carolina from his basic training and decided to come back. "My wife and I got tired of shoveling snow," he said.

In addition to receiving the French honor, Wells was previously awarded the Bronze Star, the American Campaign Medal, the Good Conduct Medal, and the

Victory Medal.

The other inductees were George Pulakos and Clyde Polk of Charlotte, David Gordon of Cary, and John Harmon of Saluda, S.C. One inductee, Frank Pruitt of Spartanburg, died recently, and his family accepted his medal. Induction into the French Legion of Honor gives the veterans the rank of Knight.

"Vernon Schmidt returns to his young days

Remembrance - An American veteran visits the former war battlefield in our region

Muenstermaifeld/Region — Vernon Schmidt, an American, whose name might be of German origin has recently paid a visit to our region. 67 years ago he has been here as well — under very different circumstances. Back then he belonged to the soldiers of the 90th American division, which helped to bring down Hitler-Germany. Now the 87 year old veteran went back to see the former battle places of his youth time. Also the Mayfield, Hatzenport, Alken and Pfaffenheck were part of this tour. Thorsten Kurpjuhn is an enthusiastic mountain biker. One day and more or less by coincidence he finds a book about the fightings at the end of the second world war in the Moselle region and realizes that he already has bypassed many of the historic places with his bike. As he has all this geographic knowledge about these places he starts to dig into the history of these past events. And again coincidence comes along. Via Facebook he meets the American author Aaron Elson. Elson wrote several books also about the last days of the German Wehrmacht (Army), where German troos fought some last desperate battles with their American foes.

Battlefield in the book

Also our region is mentioned: Hatzenport, Loef, Alken and Buchholz. Elson tells Kurpjuhn that he knows somebody who fought as a young American soldier in the battle of Pfaffenheck – Vernon Schmidt. He crossed the Moselle back then at Hatzenport and advanced to Pfaffenheck where heavy fighting commenced. And this Schmidt has been to Germany with his wife and his son Christofer to revisit the old battlefields.

The 87 year old visited also Thorsten Kurpjuhn. Both were introduced to each other by Aaron Elson. For the Munstermayfelder (Kurpjuhn) the common visit to Hatzenport, Alken and Paffenheck has been an exciting experience like a time travel into old war times.

"Vernon Schmidt is 87 years old and a very likable man from Fresno/Carlifornia" says Kurpjuhn. He shows pictures to him from Hatzenport dating 1945. Schmidt feels welcomed in Germany. When he started his tour in Habscheid / Eifel he has been heartily welcomed as well. Hatzenport he had already seen. There he once crossed the Moselle in a 'storm boat'. Now he was keen to see remaining foxholes in the forest and the cemetery in Paffenheck. They go up to the Schafberg (Sheep Hill) overlooking Alken. Here you can still see numerous foxholes. There has been heavy fighting as mountain troops counterattacked and dug in in the crest of the hill. Here or on one of the hills in the vicinity also Vernon once dug in' reports Kurpjuhn. The American stands in front of the foxholes and is emotionally touched. Immediately he remembers how hard it was to dig into this soil with all the tree roots. Then they proceed to the cemetery. Here they walk slowly between the graves. KIA on March 15th 1945 is the engraving on so many of the gravestones.

Advance into the Hunsruck mountains

Vernon Schmidt remembers this day very well. It was the day when he and his comrades advanced into the Hunsruck. Then he stops. A German soldier grave is there – it says Schmidt – a namesake. He lost his life in the terrible battle.





67 years ago the sound of heavy artillery erupted in the Mosell valley

Back then, 1945, the lovely Moselle valley was roaring with the sound of heavy gun and machine gun fire. Vernou Schmidt – just 20 years old – fought here with his 90th Division. Between Loef and Hatzenport he did an assault crossing over the Moselle.

Kurpjuhn had investigated the history before the visit of Schmidt. According to the reports Schmidt's division broke through the Westwall in the spring of 1945 as part of Patton's XII. Corps. After a few days he reached Mayen and also Muenstermaifeld and the Moselle banks. Now the order was to cross the Moselle and advance south to encircle the German Army Group G in the so called Rhine-Moselle triangle. The Germans were aware of the danger and stationed parts of the 6.SS Mountain Division in the area Alken-Brodenhach-Paffenheck. This division still showed a strong fighting spirit. On March 14th the American attack commenced. They built bridgeheads at Hatzenport and Loef and secured the hill masses south. However the Germans fought bitterly back especially at Bucholz and Pfaffenheck. Pfaffenheck changed its owner 4 times before the remaining Germans retreated 2 days later. 'Around 300 soldiers of both sides paid with their live. 5 US tanks were destroyed at Paffenheck' reports Kurpinhn.





Shockley, James A., 359/I - MD - [Ed.: the following story came in the mail about 2 days before we left to drive to the Fort Worth Reunion. When I read Jim's story, I KNEW it NEEDED to be read at the reunion. As it turned out, for the Saturday Combined Unit Lunches, President Jim Spivey had planned to read President Ronald Reagan's D-Day speech from that 40th anniversary event Jim refers to in his story. The story to follow was a perfect fit with this, and as President Spivey read it, you could hear a pin drop. The only other sounds were those that come when one is reduced to tears. This will "rip your heart out", but it is stories like this one that need to be told - over and over and over again, so that we REMEMBER THE PRICE OF FREEDOM. My heart-felt thanks goes to Jim Shockly for sharing this story. Please pass this on to everyone you know. It needs to be heard and read.] 7-11-13 - "Greetings: I am sending my dues for '13-'14 and am enclosing a short note -- on June 6, 1984, a large group of 90th Division veterans and their wives made a trip to France for the 40th Anniversary of D-Day. We heard Reagan's wonderful speech at the Beach Ceremony. Afterward, we visited the Cemetery in back of the beaches - it is beautiful! It is a place of respect and awe. At the head of the column in front of us was a tall white column engraved with the names of the soldiers buried there, -- to my great surprise, at the top of the column was the name SGT. VIRGIL TEBBE -90th Infantry Division, and my thoughts went back to 1944 in the hedgerows of Normandy. It was about July 1st. We were fighting our way to Hill 122, and Sgt. Tebbe was in front of me. There was another Sgt. with him - I think it was Sgt. Akers -- the 'strongest man' in 359/I Co. Through the thin cover of trees and vines was a clearing and a farm house with a stone fence in front. There was a Howitzer firing to the right of us at another group of men from the 359th. The hedgerow in front of us was waist high and both Sgts. climbed over it. Just as they got over, I noticed the noise of the traject and the sound --- ominous --- Instead of going to the right front, it seemed to be coming at us!! Tebbe was calling "MAMA!" very quietly, and Sgt Akers was trying to find his face with his strong right hand ----- his face was gone!!

For we've pulled one stretch in Hell


