# Important Announcement

Many readers today do not know my history with the 90th Division. I was introduced to WW2 veteran, Jim Reid, in February, 1989 - I have been involved with the 90th since I met Jim. My first Reunion was in 1989, so 2019 will mark 30 years of Reunions. In 1990, while we were still dating, he "recruited" me to take on the creation of the Newsletter for the Field Artillery groups: 343rd, 344th, 345th, & 915th. I started by using an IBM Selectric Typewriter & collected unused clip art from a suburban newspaper office. We xeroxed the newsletters; collated the pages; made address labels to attach; licked each envelope & stamped them; then took them to the Post Office - 4 times a year. We married January 1, 1991, & Jim was President of the Association that year - the Reunion was in San Antonio. I continued creating and publishing the newsletters - and keeping their mail rosters through the 2000 Reunion in Charlotte, NC. After that Reunion, Jim was appointed Executive Secretary/Treasurer - and I was named Assistant Executive Secretary/Treasurer & told by the Executive Committee that from then on, I would be doing the newsletter for the entire Association. At that time, there was no order or procedures/processes for Reunions, so I began to create a system - from "scratch". I also learned how to use the computer and honed my skills in putting a newsletter together, the result of which you have seen for the last 27 years. Everything you see today: Newsletters; Dues cards; 500 Club cards; Thank You cards; Reunion Program Book; meal tickets; + all the work that goes into the Reunions - Jim and & I created. I did the design work + all the procedures used at Reunions. Jim kept the books, negotiated hotel contracts [a master negotiator!] - and basically kept the Association alive and active. His goal was to be able to be at the 100th Reunion in 2018, and we promised the Association we would continue in our responsibilities until that time, God willing. Sadly, God took my beloved Jim Home to Heaven May 9, 2016, so he was not able to fulfil that commitment. With the help of MG [R] J. Ron Sholar, I have been able to do Jim's job & mine since then. But now it is time for me to resign while I am still of sound mind & body. So AFTER the 2019 Reunion in New Orleans, I will no longer be Executive Director. I don't know yet how I will be able to replace the income I will lose, or what I will be doing - but God does. 30 years of my life have been devoted to the 90th. There are no words to express what the Association & members have meant to me. My emotions run deep and my heart breaks at all the WW2 vets the 90th has lost.


#### Special letter from French Historian, Henri G. Levaufre

"Dear Rhoda, When I received the Spring 2018 newsletter, I was sad to read several names so familiar of old and dear friends that I met along the years since 1969: Each name brings back so many memories, so many old times, letters, so many emails and shake hands and big hugs. At home, I am working on scanning several tens of thousands pictures taken during the trips of the 90th in Europe since the first big one in 1971, or hundreds of 1944-45 pictures taken during the war. Janet and I, as we always traveled with them across Normandy, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany, we knew personally hundreds of them, and now, sad to say, I have forgotten too many of their names.. When I read Richard Grondin & Clyde Kennedy in the last bulletin, I was very sorry because I knew them for years. A friend I remember well is Jack Evans who came back to Normandy in 1967, a long time before I was even directly involved with 90th veterans. He came back again in 1995, and we spend days in the fields and across hedgerows to

When it was cleared, the mayor planted an American flag in the hedgerow, many civilians came, and we had a short ceremony in that field where so many fellows of 357/K CO like him got wounded or were killed. Janet & I visited Jack and his wife, Lois, many times in their home when they lived at Sun City, West, AZ. We had also together in Normandy a very special ceremony in front of a twin grave where two unknown German soldiers were buried. This private gesture had for Jack a very special and deeply human meaning that I am proud ;he shared with me. After Jack came back to Normandy, he wrote in 1997 a huge and magnificent book called "E-3073 The Last Battle". A close friend of Jack, John Steinmacher [Gunner] is buried at Colleville American Cemetery.. I feel Gunner was also a friend of mine who never had a chance to grow old. Henri"



And, I MEAN, a MIRACLE! What you and your husband have done will NOT be forgotten I hope to see you in San Antonio. In Christ, Edward, Lorraine and Daniel Sarkisian" [Ed.: Ed did not make it to the reunion - maybe in 2019? His letter in the column at right, tells of his search to learn about his Uncle Harry, and how Norm Richards and Henri Levaufre were able to fill in many of the blank spaces. He was even able to visit his Uncle's grave in Normandy. a great story.]

A Family Story of Harry Proudian, 357/C - as told through the research of his nephew, Edward Sarkisian - "When I first saw the 1/72 sekle [?] B-17 model my grandmother had on top of her refrigerator, as a young boy, I always wanted to see it and "wave it around". I found out it was made by my uncle, Harry A. [Antranik] Proudian, my mom's younger brother. I knew he was killed in action in WW2, but knew nothing else. No one did!! ..... Years later [1990s], I saw the TERRIBLE telegram sent to my grandparents: stamped at 2:25PM, July 23, 1944 - a Western Union Telegram - that their son, Harry Antranik Proudian was KIA in France on June 28, 1944. ... Thant launched me into a search for any history, records of what happened to him. Letters, calls, FedEx - all sent to the National Personnel Records Center, and other centers - They all KNEW NOTHING!! A few weeks prior to 9/11/01, I attended the 90th Reunion in San Antonio, TX. It was an extremely memorable occasion. But no - no one knew anything about a Harry Proudian. However, I gave my United Pilot Business card to a Norm Richards to see if he could find out anything. A few months later, he called me and asked what I was looking for. I said, 'To find out what happened to my Uncle!' Norm sent my info request to Henri Levaufre, who had my Uncles' complete records!! If I recall correctly, that was in 2001. I met Norm in Paris at CDG Airtport in 2004 for the Moselle Reunion. It was BEYOND words to meet the vets - and to visit my Uncle's grave - and - to meet Henri Levaufre. There is SO much, so I will try to summarize. Since 2004, I promised myself to take my family there, and on June 2, 2014, I took my wife, son, a sister, and 2 friends to Normandy. Beyond words. The home we stayed at in Morsaline, greeted us with a double rainbow in the sky as we pulled up to the house. - WOW! On June 28, 2014, as I was packing up to head to United Airlines Simulator Training that I had postponed for months. That day was 70 years to the day that my mother's younger brother was Killed-In-Action in Port-Bail [?], France. Mom also became quite ill that day. I had to continue my United training in Denver. Mom only got worse - the Blessed Lord Jesus was intending to bring her into His presence on July 14, 2014, so she was re-united with her brother. My grandmother, a survivor of the Armenian Genocide, came to this country and had to sons: one died as a toddler, & her son, Harry, who was shipped off to France to fight in WW2. She could NEVER COMPREHEND he died. The Lord kept my grandmother alive until almost EXACTLY 40 years to the day he was KIA [less 7 days]. She died June 21, 1984. To me - she was one great mentor in my life. She NEVER uttered a bad word - NEVER....Like the Israelites wandering in the desert for 40 years, in testing. ... She remained faithful, reading her Bible on the back porch of her home - in Armenian. Like Job - NEVER a word against her Lord God ..... The last verse I got to read to my mom in a cell phone call from London on June 24, 2014, was Psalm 119:15 - 'May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord my Redeemer'. The Lord works in powerful ways. Ed." [Ed.: I hope Ed's journey will inspire readers who are struggling with some of the same issues = lack of information about your WW2 Veteran family member. Remember that Norm Richards, Tyler Alberts, and Henri & his son, Christian Levaufre, are THE BEST sources of information and have helped countless numbers of family members find information about their family member who fought for our freedom in WW2 - thousands of whom gave their lives. There are people reading this who can attest to the value of asking for help from these 4 Historians and were able to get some closure about their loved one as a result. It is never too late to go for it!"]





Ed.: This information was sent to me [Rhoda] by COL [R] Sandy Westbrook ARCOM. To my knowledge, Robert Essler was never a member of the 90th Division Association, but he deserves to be remembered, and thank you to Sandy Westbrook for sending this information. He had quite a life!

### Robert Lawrence Essler - August 10, 1925-October 27, 2018

Robert Lawrence Essler, 93, passed away on Saturday, October 27, 2018 at 1:51 p.m. in Fort Worth, Tarrant County, Texas. Funeral mass will be held at St.Rita Catholic Church in Fort Worth, with Father Eric Groner officiating, on Friday, November 2, 2018 at 10:00a.m. Burial will follow the service at moore Cemetery in Arlington, TX. Robert Essler was born on Monday, August 10, 1925 and Scotland Texas to Joseph Essler and Rosie Hanke Essler. Robert L. Essler married Minnie "Midge" Johnson in 1981. He joined the U.S. Army and received his military training in Camp Fannie, TX; from there he went to Fort Meade, MD to overseas. On D-day, he was sent to Germany from 1941 to 1946, WWII. Robert received an Honorable Discharge on Tuesday, June 18, 1946 from 90th Division, Company E, 359th Infantry. On Sunday, June 5, 2016, Bob Essler was honored in Normandy, France, for his service and fighting for their freedom. There, Robert Essler received the French Legion of Honor Medal. Bob was very proud of having served his country. After the war he worked in Wichita Falls, TX for different companies. He owned Industrial Electric in Wichita Falls, TX for 2 to 3 years in the early 1960s. In 1967, he went to work for LTV Aerospace & Defense in Grand Prairie, TX for 24 ½ years, building electrical circuit boards in airplanes. He also worked on the night carrier landing training instruments (trainers) in California and Florida. After retirement in 1991, he continued working by volunteering for 15 years for the Vought Heritage Foundation -- making panel boards for planes for restoration in preparation for museums and historical presentations. He loved to work with his hands, and was very talented with detail. He could always figure out a way to fix something that was broken. He was an active Catholic member for Fort Worth Catholic Church. A member of the Knights of Columbus since 1940 with a 3rd degree. He worked for the Arlington Charities. He loved to listen to country and western music and dance to two-step and waltz. He taught his daughter how to dance. He is preceded in death by his wife Midge Johnson Essler, his baby infant son Joseph Essler, his two brothers (Bill and George) and four sisters (Bernice, JoAnn, Eleanor, and Lydia). He is survived by his daughter Barbara Essler Downes and her husband Robert Downes of Haslet, TX. His granddaughter Amanda Lynn Downes Adams and her husband Derek Adams of Roanoke, TX, and grandson Brian Lawrence Downes and his wife Amber Marlette Downes of Watauga, TX and five great-grandchildren Bryony, Kolby, Drake, Jack, and Jacob.

Bob Essler Awarded French Medal of Honor. In 1944, Bob was assigned to the 90th Division of Company E359 Infantry. The 90th Infantry Division was nicknamed "Tough 'Ombres," a United States Army unit that served in World War I and World War II. The "Tough 'Ombres" division was raised from draftees from the states of Texas and Oklahoma during World War I. Bob wore the "Tough 'Ombres" shoulder patch with pride. On D-Day, the 90th invaded France at Utah Beach and had at least one unit in contact with the enemy every day from D-Day to VE Day. The 90th included more than 35,000 men. This Division earned the Invasion Arrowhead award and all five Battle Stars for Normandy, Northern France Ardennes (Battle of the Bulge), Rhineland, Central Europe, and also the French Croix de Guerre. Bob Essler was never wounded. His closest call to being shot was in Germany. He was walking through some farm buildings, when a bullet passed behind his head and went between his gun barrel and the magazine. He complained that it ruined his rifle and he had to replace it. In May 1945, the 90th embarked on its final combat mission...the rescue of Prague, Czechoslovakia. The mission was to clear a route through Regan Pass in the Sudeten Mountains. This allowed the 4th Armored Division to advance into Prague. The mission was successful. The 4th then rolled through the line into Prague. The 90th had done its work well so that whenever there is talk about valiant men, the "Tough 'Ombres" are sure to be mentioned.




